

Introduction and Methodology

This document provides a high-level overview of the latest data available on socioeconomic indicators for Sitka. Information is presented in four segments:

- Demographics
- Economics
- Industry trends
- COVID19-related factors (case and vaccination rates, and mitigation funding)

For some key indicators, data for comparable communities and/or Alaska overall are provided as context.

Sources of data include Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development (DOLWD), Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G), the federal Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA), Small Business Administration (SBA), and various McKinley Research Group research publications. Where warranted, monetary values have been presented in both nominal and real (inflation-adjusted) dollars using the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) Urban Alaska Consumer Price Index (CPI).


Summary of Key Trends

Key trends related to Sitka's economy are summarized below. Additional indicators describing Sitka's population, employment, industry trends, COVID-19 impacts, and additional macroeconomic factors may be found in the detailed data sections, which follow this summary of key trends.

Sitka population declines for fifth consecutive year

- Population declined by 516 people (-6%) over the past five years.
- Between 2020 and 2021, deaths (79) outnumbered births (76), leading to the first year of natural decrease.
- Net outmigration continued between 2020 and 2021, with a net loss of 54 residents.
 - The rate of net outmigration has slowed since high outmigration between 2016 and 2017 (-179 residents) and between 2017 and 2018 (-158 residents).

Sitka Net Migration, 2002-2021





- Sitka has an aging population.
 - The number of residents 65 and older increased by 327 (28%) over the last decade.
 - The working age population (ages 20-64) fell by 646 (-11%), and the population of children (0-19) declined by 357 (-16%).
- Additional population decline is projected by DOLWD for Sitka through 2045.

Sitka's economy made gains towards recovery from COVID-related impacts in 2020

- Sitka's resident labor force those employed and the unemployed seeking work increased in 2021 compared to 2020.
 - o The number of employed residents rose by 53 people (+1%) while those seeking work increased by 29 people (+24%).
 - Sitka's average annual unemployment rate decreased to 4.6% in 2021 from a high of 7.3% in 2020. In 2021, Sitka's average unemployment rate was below the Alaska level of 6.4%.

- The number of self-employed people in Sitka, including commercial fishermen, declined by 2% in 2020 compared to 2019.
- Sitka's economy regained 380 wage and salary jobs in 2021, a 10% increase over the same period in 2020 but still 4% short of employment in 2019.
 - This recovery in wage and salary employment outpaced the statewide recovery, with Alaska 2021 employment levels remaining 6% below 2019 employment.
 - Sitka's jobs recovery also outpaced comparison communities of Juneau and Ketchikan, whose average 2021 employment levels were 8% and 12% below 2019 levels, respectively.

• Local residents held 62% of wage and salary jobs based in Sitka in 2020. Sitka's resident hire percentage declined slightly over the last decade from 67% in 2011.

Seafood sector was heavily impacted by COVID-related changes in demand in 2020

- Declines in the demand and price for high-value seafood products in 2020 contributed to a 38% drop in the estimated value of seafood products landed in Sitka compared to 2019.
- The number of active Sitka commercial fishing permit holders also declined in 2020, with 32 fewer active permit holders compared to 2019.
- Seafood processing employment increased by 30% in 2021 compared to 2019, one of few sectors with employment above 2019 levels in the community.

Sitka Estimated Seafood Landings Value (\$ millions), 2011-2020





Cruise passenger capacity expected to more than double compared to 2019

- The shortened 2021 cruise season brought 35,000 passengers to Sitka, after 218,600 in 2019 and zero passengers in 2020
- Based on ship capacity, Sitka could host up to 457,000 cruise passengers in 295 port calls in 2022. This represents more than double the number of passengers visiting Sitka in 2019.
 - o The actual volume of cruise passengers who will visit Sitka in 2022 may fall short of this stated ship capacity, if ships come less than fully booked.

- Heavily visitor-affected sectors added back jobs in 2021, but employment fell short of 2019 levels.
 - The scenic and sightseeing sector regained an annual average 48 jobs in 2021, a 96% increase from 2020 yet 22% below 2019.
 - o The accommodation sector regained 20 jobs in 2021, an increase of 21% from 2020 yet 22% below 2019.
 - Employment in the food service industry increased by 15% in 2021, leaving employment in food services 8% below 2019 levels.

Sitka Cruise Passenger Volume, 2013-2021 Actuals, 2022 Forecast





- In 2021, Sitka's air passenger traffic remained 10,000 passengers below 2019 levels, an 11% reduction from pre-pandemic volumes. Air passenger traffic did exceed 2019 levels in July and September of 2021, pointing to renewed demand for travel.
- Alaska Marine Highway System embarkations in Sitka have declined significantly over the past three years. In 2021, embarkations were 2,600 below 2019, a 74% drop.

Other macroeconomic factors are impacting Sitka's economy

- In late 2021 and the first months of 2022, the U.S. experienced the highest rates of inflation since the 1980s.
 - Alaska's inflation rate averaged 4.9% in 2021, a reversal of the deflation (negative inflation rate) experienced in 2020.
 - o Inflation in Alaska was similar to the national inflation rate of 4.7% in 2021.

- The number of homes sold in Sitka declined to 32 in 2021, below the average annual of 40 home sold between 2017 and 2020.
 - The average residential home price was \$431,797 in 2021, a 6% increase from average prices of \$407,000 between 2017 and 2020.
- Sitka rental vacancy rates averaged 7.5% in 2021 following high vacancy rates of 13.8% in 2020. Sitka's median monthly home rental rate of \$1,323 in 2021 was essentially unchanged from 2020.
- The number of new residential housing units constructed in Sitka increased in 2020 (32 units added) and 2021 (37 units added) compared to the preceding years. This increase was driven by a higher number of multi-family units added in 2020 and 2021.


Demographics

Figure 1. Population, Sitka, 1991 to 2021






Figure 2. Population Change in Sitka and Select Communities, 2012-2021 (2012 = 1.00)




Figure 4. Birthrates for Alaska and Select Communities (Births per 1,000 People), 2021

Economic Profile


The following sections describe high-level trends in Sitka's labor force, employment, and other key macroeconomic factors. The following definitions apply:

- **Labor force** Labor force statistics including unemployment rate describe Sitka residents' participation in the labor force either through employment or those seeking work but not currently employed (unemployed).
- Wage and salary employment Wage and salary employment refers to employment of people by businesses/government entities located in Sitka. These employment data do not include self-employed persons and therefore excludes commercial fishermen. Uniformed U.S. military personnel are also excluded.
- **Self-employment** Self-employment refers to individuals who earn income as a sole proprietor rather than through wage and salary employment. This indicator includes commercial fishermen.
- Average annual inflation Inflation rates are based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI).
- **Nominal dollars** Prices or rates not adjusted to reflect inflation.
- Real dollars Prices or rates adjusted to reflect inflation using the Urban Alaska CPI.






Figure 9. Total Wage & Salary Employment by Month, Sitka, 2019-2021






Figure 12. Nonresidents in the Sitka Workforce, 2020



Figure 14. Local Residents as a Percentage of Workforce, 2020




Figure 15. Total Personal Income, Sitka, 2011-2020 (\$ millions)


Figure 16. Per-Capita Personal Income, Sitka, 2011-2020


Figure 18. Per-Capita Income by Area, 2020




Figure 20. Average Residential Home Sales Price, Sitka, 2017-2021






Figure 26. Monthly Seafood Processing Employment, Sitka, 2019-2021


Figure 27. Cruise Passenger Volume, Sitka, 2013-2022




Figure 31. COVID-19 Case Counts, Sitka, March 2020-March 2022

Figure 32. COVID-19 Vaccination Rate by Area as of March 2022






